CAROC are planning a night of indoor karting. This is an ideal opportunity to meet other drivers, have a fun, competitive day and tune up your driving skills for the summer season. Bring the whole family! We want more women in racing. Start the kids early - minimum age to drive is 13 and they must be 54 inches tall.

The karts are specifically designed for indoor use and are powered by Honda engines burning propane. The engines are rated at 9.5 HP but Brett tells us they are tuned to produce about 13 HP. MPGP also has a lounge facility where food and drink are available.

All drivers must wear driving suits and full face helmets with a neck collar. You can bring your own gear if you have it. If not, MPGP has everything you need. If you use a MPGP helmet, you must wear a head sock (provided). If you use your own helmet, this is not required. All drivers must attend a driver's briefing before going on-track. After attending the briefing, all

•We would recommend you arrive 20 minutes early (if possible) for registration and orientation. Make sure you are wearing closed toed shoes as you will not be allowed to race with sandals, high heels, flip flops, crocs or other any other incorrect footwear. Also make sure your guests are aware of any age, height, or weight restrictions as they may apply to your event. Please call 708-343-RACE (7223) with any questions prior to your arrival. Track management decision in this regard is final.


- •A valid form of ID with picture may be required to race. You can contact the track directly with any concerns at 708-343-RACE (7223) or visit their website for additional information.
- •During the winter months and in an effort to keep our pricing aggressive, we do keep the track area climate fairly cool so please prepare accordingly.
